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It was Christmas in Prison And the food was real good We had turkey and pistols Carved out of wood.

John Prine's unconventional Christmas song "Christmas in Prison" is about a homesick inmate. But the incarcerated person may not be in a literal cell. "It's about a person being somewhere like a prison, in a situation they do not want to be in "he said" and wishing they were somewhere else" The imagery used is of an actual prison.

Dr Christian Jarrett explains the plight of a prisoner when day after day, year after year, they have no space to call their own, no choice over who to be with, what to eat or where to go. There is suspicion and threat everywhere. Love, or even a gentle human touch can

be difficult to find. You are separated from family and friends. There is also an assumption that if you are sent to prison, you must have done something horrible and need to be punished. If they are to cope, the prisoners confined to this environment have no option but to change and adapt. some do so for the better while others have festering wounds that only make them bitter and revengeful.

The Hope Prison

Ministry shares a story from Africa. In Africa's prisons and in many parts of the world, Jesus is still revealing Himself in unexpected ways. Recently, a prison gangster reached out for help to the Prison Ministry. He had grown up without a father and his childhood was full of brokenness and anger. One day, his father contacted him for the first time in years. the prisoner had no clue how to respond, now he had to deal not only with his long term in prison but also with complicated emotions of re connecting with his father.

Initially he turned to his gang brothers for help---- he received the shocking advice "Go speak to Hope Prison Ministry" The Prison Ministry reports, the gangs should have been opposing them, but even the enemies see Jesus in their work. They are the unlikely witnesses to the Christmas Story!! Ministry Volunteers we see the hope and welcoming light of the Star of Bethlehem. The Gospel of John (1:5) says that the Light came into the darkness of the world and the darkness will never put the light out. An apt quote from Prison Fellowship " It is amazing how History repeats itself--unless you deal with it. If you are in a cold, damp, dark place- mould grows- but when you shine light on it and bring warmth to it, the disfunction dies." Our endeavour is to always strive to renew, reform and rehabilitate.

Society see prison as a black hole of despair but as Prison

Prisons can be dark places because of the misery, loneliness and isolation, but in our own little way, we can help to brighten the days of the inmates. Many of the Prison Ministry volunteers have been able, with the generous donations of sponsors, to gift clothes and other essentials to the prisoners. The symbolic giving of gifts during this season reminds us of the



greatest gift of all--Jesus. While all Jails are not accessible to visitors, we can always give the most priceless gift - that of our fervent prayers, not only for the prisoners but also for their suffering families. Each Unit was tried ways and means of being a light in the dark existence of the lives of many a prisoner. Though the Pandemic brought activities to a halt and entry to some Jails was restricted, the hope that lies eternal in the hearts of the volunteers. their commitment in to

kept them strong Prison Ministry.

Research shows that human beings have the ability to evolve and survive the worst possible situations. In fact, we as Prison Ministry volunteers can reach out by finding ways of keeping our own hopes intact, remain positive in the face of rejection and resilient enough to spring back when the opportunity arises to be of service to the children in the Remand Homes and the thousands of men and women languishing behind prison bars.

After all, the Hope, Joy and Love of the Christmas season should be the reason why the baby Jesus came into this troubled world.

Arthur Road Prison Report

Prison Ministry Mumbai at Arthur Road Jail has earned recognition from the Jail authorities as one of the hard working and service oriented visiting NGOs. Our Workforce, Authorities and Inmates share a trusted relationship.

Due to pandemic, we faced a temporary "stop-work" to our continuity of good work. Being one of the "High Profile" Central Jails of Mumbai, this was understandable. We continue to pray every month, trusting Our Lord to soon open up the doors of prison to continue with our mission.

However, we looked for opportunities to work from outside, amongst other units. DSIS at Matunga requested for a few things. We did support and had the pleasure of meeting the Superintendent, Mr. Anil Pawar when we gifted some articles.

In November 21, the same unit approached us again to help them supply with "toothpaste, toothbrushes, soaps", to be included in their Christmas hampers for the children. We donated and in addition gave 12 bottles of Dettol for their in-house use. After all, Prison Ministry Mumbai is one family which works with different prions and observation home. We look forward to help and cater to such needs in future too. Seeking God's mercy, compassion and grace to lift us out of pandemic soon.

Byculla Prison Report

The lockdown was frightening as no visits and more over many new volunteers. This made us think beyond as we have a very dedicated group of volunteers both young and old, both experienced and self-giving. We thus planned small online activities to keep the group motivated, with entertainment and games. We had legal awareness sessions, and 5 weeks of intensive counselling sessions as this was the need of our volunteers, we had volunteers of all Mumbai participating.

Our entire group pondered with many debating and brain storming sessions and after considering the ideas of all, we came up with the tag line of "Crime free Families ". Being online era we planned to release videos with detailed ways and procedures to help families and individuals to give up their bad habit of doing wrong things. Prevention is better than cure was the motivating phrases used by Fr. Glasten Gonsalves. When each video was released, we received feedback and this helped us to improve the quality of our videos. We began with our series of 7 videos focusing our attention on different age groups beginning with pregnancy to seniors, these are under circulation. We do continue to get feedback and also request to help out in situations on a personal basis.

We were pleased that PMM selected one of our members to start a Rehabilitation team and this gave us a further push, and so a team among our volunteers was formed and we are working at the juvenile home 3 days a week with the boys and the girls section at the Dongri home. Our goal is Crime free families and we are working towards this, but surely, we will achieve crime free individuals. Today we are a small team. We look forward to extend the group so we can help more children by the right way of counselling. We are working on different therapies to bring about a change in them as children are our future.



Kalyan Prison Report

We are called by Christ to serve the world as He did, seek to reform, redeem, and re-integrate. The main goal of the PMM is to help them recover from dehumanization and bring about restoration and healing through our continuous support. The month of November saw a flurry of activities at Aadharwadi Jail.

On 2nd November 2021, 5 Volunteers of PMM took 120 maxis/nighties for the women inmates and clothes for 7 children of the inmates. These were partially sponsored by PM volunteers of Children's Dongri Home, Ms Lily Vaz and Ms Maria Fernandes of Mira Road. We are grateful to two anonymous donors from Dahisar and Kalyan. Ms Josephine Chouri and Ms Monica Chettiar purchased the maxis and the children's clothes were purchased by Mr John Misquitta and son. The Superintendent of the Adharwadi Jail appreciated this gesture by PMM to make Diwali a little brighter for the inmates.



0n 22nd November, a skin camp was conducted for 125 women prisoners. Holy Cross Hospital, Kalyan arranged 2 Doctors to examine all the patients. They were assisted by PMM Volunteers, Ms Michelle Lopez, Ms Josephine Chouri and Ms Cecilia Jagtap.

On the next day, a similar skin camp was conducted for 153 male inmates. Holy Cross Hospital, Kalyan arranged for two doctors, Dr. Mody and Ajay Sharma.



The PMM volunteers present were Mr Dominic Dsouza, Mr Jude Francis and Mr John Misquitta. The PMM Director, Fr Glasten Gonsalves met the Superintendent, Mr Sadaphule and he expressed the need to conduct an eye camp for the inmates. Medicines for the affected prisoners would be distributed shortly.

A lot has been achieved and the Ministry has a long way to go. This is all possible because of God's providence and commitment of the volunteers. The Volunteers live by the motto - Be a love bomb - let it explode, not to kill but to heal the broken hearted. These words are translated into action by the selfless service that the Prison Ministry members offer.

Taloja Prison Report

Prison is a storehouse of pain and suffering. The inmates experience deprivation of freedom, and extended period of isolation from their loved ones. Our God is a freedom loving God, he sent his son Jesus to liberate us. We are called to be the light and salt in the world and that urges Prison Ministry Mumbai to work for righteousness amid the tyranny of society.

The Entertainment Room from where music is relayed to all the barracks, the entire wiring and sound system was set up by PMM. Recently the laptop has been repaired and the amplifier replaced. The music hour helps to alleviate the mood of the prisoners.

An inmate who has been operating the music system is due to be released shortly. He requested Fr Glasten Gonsalves to help him with some Computer course. This will be an effort to reintegrate him in Society.

In the Pandemic, 500 reusable masks were distributed to the prisoners. An Oximeter and 10 litres of hand sanitizer was also donated. This activity was appreciated by the Authorities.

The Ministry applies biblical principles to difficult situations. It is a powerful testimony to a frequently doubtful world that the Gospel is not just theoretical philosophy but a life-giving relationship with Christ who can change human hearts and bring hope to circumstances the world may consider as hopeless.



Thane Jail Report

With Pope Francis giving the call for the Synod with the key word of 'Journeying', it was an awakening voice for all of us to acknowledge that in our involvement with Society, very often we are not able to solve problems but journey with those on the periphery in their struggles and hopes. This is exactly what we, at St John Baptist Parish connected with the Prison Ministry had in mind as we encountered the inmates of the Thane Prison Cell. We took the opportunity of the festival of lights (Diwali) to bring in some brightness in the dark world of the prison inmates. First our attention went to the 140 women inmates of the Prison, to whom we gave blankets and towels. One could visibly see the shine on their wrinkled faces as they accepted the things. not because they needed it. but the giving was symbolic of our desire to recognise their presence, and journey with their pain and struggle.

Next, we were deeply moved looking at the 6 children born to the inmates...and what better way, than to clothe them with some colorful clothes which brought smiles on their faces and tears in our eyes. We also realised that those in charge of such responsibility such as guarding





a prison, go through their own journey of ups and downs in the dark cells of the so-called rejects of society. To these workers and officials, including the kind and human hearted Superintendent, there was a round of tasty delicious festive sweets. What we noticed is the fact that very often, such efforts of these officials are taken for granted or just criticized. When these were appreciated, there comes the extra spark of zest to do the assigned work with dedication and with purpose.

All in all, it was a touching, poignant experience of our brush with this sector of humanity...and our gratitude goes to Fr Thomson, for his support and generosity in letting the St John's Prison Ministry Cell achieve its activities of the Prison Ministry Cell and that these continue. We returned with one thought. that we are no one to judge people 's motives for their actions as to why they are in prison, but our role was to bring a little of the life and kindness of God in their lives.


REPORTS- CHILDREN'S HOME

Dongri Observation Home Report

Heart filled with Gratitude

Whatsoever you do to the least of my Brothers that you do unto me. These words are carved on my mind. Another quotation from the Bible which is still vivid is the Biblical quotation in Mathew 25:36,40 "I was in prison and you came to visit me ... I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me."

Our Volunteers are our strength, prayer is our power house, inconvenience is our convenience, God's providence is our Bank Balance and Begging is our Lifestyle. This helps us keep ourselves grounded. We are blessed with Mr. Rahul Kanthikar as our Superintendent who welcomes our Ministry with respect and kindness.



I say blessed, as PMM were the first ones to enter after the pandemic.

Dongri Observation Home today houses over 110 Children in need of care and protection (CNCP) and the Children in conflict with Law (CCL). In September, 2021 our first mission after the lockdown was the Renovation of the Computer Lab and Installation of 10 Brand New Computers for both the Boys and Girls Section where they are trained with the Basic Computer knowledge. Similarly, we have started Counseling sessions, Beautician courses, Cookery classes, Art and Craft sessions, Tuitions for Class Xth (Hindi Medium) NIOS has begun, Meditations, Yoga and Exercise, Bakery, Sports & Calligraphy which will begin shortly and various courses which will elevate their self-esteem and give them a purpose in life once they are set free. In our own small ways, we have been conducting various therapies to keep them engaged with Play, Story Telling, Paint and Drawing.



The last quarter we have conducted many activities to keep ourselves engaged with them. Some of the activities are the 2 Days Dental Camps where 120 kids were screened, various treatments from scaling, tooth extractions and fillings were done. Another big assignment that we took was preparing Diwali Decorations from Diyas, Toran's and flower pots were made. These Decorations were sold at Sessions Court. We also encouraged children to prepare Diwali Sweets which were made in-house and relished on Diwali day. In addition, we had Children's Day Celebration on Nov 13th with entertainment, music, and dance. We also distributed snacks and a personal hygiene kit to every child.

Blessed to have Fr. Glasten as our PMM Director and Bishop Allwyn, who motivate us with their overwhelming support and guidance always and we felt likewise with Fr. Joe (Ex. Director) and dearest Rowena as Ex-Coordinator. God bless them all for their commitment and service. We are grateful to our Donors, Collaborators, Volunteers and Well-wishers for their timely support and contributions without which, it would not be possible to conduct all these activities. Maria and I have experienced this tremendous joy, the joy of giving your all, your time, talent & treasure. Do you want to give your time, talent and treasure and experience that joy which no one can give?

Mankhurd Bal Kalyan Report

The Children's Aid Society is a pioneer nongovernmental organization in the field of child development, child protection and child rehabilitation. The Children's Aid Society was established in 1927. This institution serves more than 2,500 children. Bal Kalyan Institution is meant for the benefit of children who are victims of natural calamity, social apathy, and death of parents. They cater to children between the age group of 3yrs upto 18years. Owing to one or a combination of socio-economic factors, and for no fault on their own, when children are found in the dumps, BKN tries to provide them child friendly services such as:

- Residential Care, Medical and Paramedical Services.
- Formal Education and Vocational Training.
- Case Work Practice, Counseling and Guidance.
- Opportunities for Development of Character

and Personality through games and recreational programmes.



To support the service that this institution has to offer to these children, many NGOs support Bal Kalyan Nagari.

Prison Ministry Mumbai under the Leadership of Fr. Glasten Gonsalves the team of professional volunteers regularly visit Bal Kalyan Nagari to train and empower these children. The children are taught spoken English, Basic Maths, art and craft and basic life lessons through fun and games. Recently Prison Ministry Mumbai has arranged a computer lab with 6 well equipped computers. The Ministry felt the importance of training the children with basic computer skills to cope and be on par with technology during these pandemic times. A full-time instructor has been appointed to teach the children the necessary basic computer skills to help them later to define their career goals, entrepreneurship, and job opportunities.

Mankhurd New Observation Home

This observation home has missing children, run away children, victim children, child beggars, etc. These children are produced before the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) as 'Children in Need of Care & Protection (CNCP). The home has two separate sections one for boys and one for girls and the age group for these children is from 3-12. Prison Ministry volunteers have embarked on a mission to collaborate and assist the children in vocational skills and miscellaneous activities that are conducted by the Institution. Languages such as English, Hindi and Marathi are taught including basic knowledge of computers. At the same time, we assist in the personality development of the children - a version of them that reverberates confidence, enthusiasm and serenity. So, our volunteers assist in grooming them and help then to let go of their fears and be confident. We also check with them about their ambitions and motivate them to achieve it.





The pandemic paralysed and changed the system of education with the distinctive rise of e-learning. Keeping that in mind, and to make education children friendly and interesting, we set up an Audio Visual (AV) room which was inaugurated on 2nd November 2021 by Bishop Allwyn D'Silva, Chairman of PMI in the presence of Ms. Trupti Jadhav the Superintendent, the Deputy Superintendent, Fr. Glasten Gonsalves, Director of Prison Ministry Mumbai, Mr. Walter D'Souza and our volunteers.

The health of the children is our priority. Hence, we provided them with masks and sanitisers and other necessities that were required for their safety. We also provided them with clothes.

One of our foresights is venturing into new areas and new homes. Thus, we reached out to Sukh Santhi (neighbouring Children's Home) and donated bedsheets and women clothing in the presence of Superintendent Rajeswary.

Our service in this Ministry gives us joy and fulfilment as we feel privileged to bring a ray of light and hope to the less fortunate the least and the lost.

DSIS Matunga Report

LEARNING IS FUN AT DSIS MATUNGA

15th November 2021 will go down in Prison Ministry Mumbai history as an auspicious day when the Children's Home at DSIS Matunga, opened its doors to welcome Prison Ministry volunteers (Matunga unit) to co-operate with them in giving the young boys (ages 6-18) the positives of gaining knowledge and learning new skills under our slogan of **"Learning is Fun"**.

We had the honour of having Fr. Glasten Gonsalves, Director, Prison Ministry Mumbai and Mr. Satish Bansode, the Superintendent of cutting the ribbon. A class of 25 boys were put under our care (although some of them will be transient). It was a pleasure to see the smiling faces of the boys who waited excitedly in anticipation – wondering what will happen next!

The date was special to us because it coincided with Children's Day (14th November) and one of our volunteers' sponsored slippers for the boys which they wore on 14th November when the school had a special event.



From Day One i.e. 15th November, we began our activities under four fields - School Education, Art & Craft, Counselling and Baking/Culinary. Since the Matunga home has a structured school system, our volunteers too, follow a defined time table each week. Our volunteers have started to teach the boys to speak and write simple English words. In the Art & Craft classes they were shown how to make flower vases, Christmas cards and other items. Excitement is more during the culinary classes when different food items like coconut ladoos, sev puri, vegetable sandwiches, fruit salad and milk shakes are prepared and they get a chance to savour them. Some of our volunteers focus on Counselling the boys - encouraging them to accept themselves as God's beautiful creation and how to help others and live together like a family. Moral stories are told following which, the boys share what they learnt.

The children have been introduced to the concept of how each one is created in God's image and likeness and that we should respect one another without thinking of any differences and treating all with love.

Regular classes are held from 9:30 am - 3:45 pm (Mon-Fri) and 10:30 am - 12 noon (Sat).

We conducted two Dental Camps on 17th & 24th November 2021 in collaboration with Mumbai Health Outreach. Our special thanks to Dr. Richard Pereira and his team of dentists who did screening, scaling, fillings and tooth extractions. Gift hampers (sponsored through a generous well-wisher) containing toothbrush, toothpaste, face towel, chocolate & soft drink were given to the children.

Though recently started in DSIS Matunga, but we get the feeling that we have been there for a long time. It's the welcome from the young boys, the smile on their faces, the cooperation and support from Mr. Bansode and his staff which makes us look forward to our service in Matunga. Special thanks to Fr. Glasten Gonsalves and our Matunga volunteers for their sacrifice, dedication and commitment. This would not have been possible without their support.





REPORT- INTERCESSORY

There is a saying that out of every bad situation, there is always good that comes out of it and so, during the lockdown, as we were not able to visit the prisons, it was the brainwave of our former Secretary and Co-ordinator of the Dongri Unit - Rowena Lewis, to start the 3:00 pm Intercessory platform as the PMM Dongri Intercession which was then renamed PMM intercessors.



It was a day of joy when we celebrated the First Anniversary of our Intercessory platform on 13th September 2021. The uniqueness of it was, 'that there was not a single day that the intercessors did not meet for prayers'. During intercession, we would pray for all the intentions of Prison Ministry India in lieu of the visits to the prisons. Our prayers did not go unanswered as many of the petitions prayed for, came to fruition. Our dynamic Director of PMM Fr. Glasten Gonsalves wanted to take this intercession a step further and came up with the suggestion to have a Recollection for all the Mumbai volunteers.

And so, on 4th November 2021, the day when the Festival of Lights was celebrated, our topic for the Recollection was "Jesus the Light of the World". It was not a coincidence, but a way of saying "Jesus is the only Light of the World".

Our speaker for the evening was Bro Conrad Kitt of the Divine Retreat Centre, Potta.

The Recollection began with a beautiful Praise & Worship led by the PMM Intercessors, which not only paved the way for the talk by Bro Conrad, but also prepared and opened the hearts and the minds of all the participants who were kept in rapt attention by Br Conrad.

Mission Sunday with Prison Ministry Free Legal Aid



I quote form (Jer 1: 5 "I chose you before I gave you life, and before you were born I selected you)

December 1991 we had the Babri Masjid demolition there was rioting, burning of shops and murder, Commissioner of Bombay Police Julio Rebeiro issued orders to arrest wherever death took place, I was a victim of that order. I was arrested and put in police lock up. The police arrested me under section IPC 304 (Section 304 IPC provides punishment for culpable homicide not amounting to murder. "Whoever commits culpable homicide not amounting to murder, shall be punished with imprisonment for life, or imprisonment for either description of a term which may extend to 10 years.)

Next day I was produced in Mulund 27th Magistrate Court and given bench bail. This was my first brush with the law and prisoners who were brought to court. My case lasted for 7 years. At every date I would meet many of the prisoners from different prisons and always thought of them living in prisons.

In June 1997 my final hearing was presented. I stood for over 2 hours in the witness box waiting for my Judgment and that day I realized what the difference was between Acquitted and Convicted. I was acquitted but learned a lot about the IPC law and inmates

Fr Joe Gonsalves and Sr Dina were my mentors who introduced me to Prison Ministry in the year 2006. My first prison visit was Thane Central Prison and I realized the 1991 incident, the Lord had planned for me, (Mt 25-35/36). I visited most of the prison and balwadis in Mumbai. The Lord has a plan for each one of us.



Love for Humanity Ripples around the World

An Advocate who practices law went to take vakalatnama and the Prisoner has been in jail for almost five years and there is no legal representation. The Advocate faced a lot of hurdles running from pillar to post searching for the prisoner and the hospital authority were not allowing to meet him. At the end of the day, he met him in his ward and was surprised that for four and half years no one visited him. He had an open-heart surgery at that time he was admitted for TB. When the Advocate visited him, his eyes were filled with



tears of joy, because since his arrest, that was the first time that someone was visiting him. In the same way a couple of times the Advocate visited the Prisoners generating God's unconditional Love to Humanity.

Whatever one does anything to other humans, one creates ripple effect and it affects others whether good or bad or sharing joy and love or kindness affects everyone. Our every action models others and unknowingly, people follow the good action that we do.

What it means to 'hope all things'

In I Cor. 13:7, it says, "love 'hopes all things" (I Cor. 13:7).

The meaning of these words take shape with words of Pope Francis and the actions of Providence Sister, Dorothy Rasche of Indiana, USA.

In his apostolic exhortation, Amoris Laetitia (The Joy of Love), Pope Francis comments on the words "love hopes all things." "The phrase speaks of the hope of one who knows that others can change, mature and radiate unexpected beauty and untold potential," he notes.

This explanation perfectly describes the love that Sister

Dorothy feels for the female inmates she ministers to at the Rockville Correctional Facility in Rockville.

24 For her vears-and continuing-of serving in this capacity, she recently received the Corrections Ministry Service Award from the archdiocesan Corrections Ministry.

"I had been visiting men's and women's prisons for years," she told The Criterion. She said the late Father Joseph Kuran, who at the time was pastor at St. Joseph Parish in Rockville, "asked if any of the Sisters

of Providence would be willing to go with him to the Correctional Facility, and I said yes. That was in October of 1997."

Each Friday evening from 7-8:30 p.m. she holds a Catholic worship service that all are invited to attend. The participants are currently involved in a Bible study on the Nicene Creed.

When asked what keeps her in the ministry, her answer is immediate: "Love of the women. I love them, and they love me."

Sister Dorothy specifically loves "their humanness. They're no different than any other person. They have the same problems, the same concerns, the same yearnings and desires as anyone else. They just happen to have gotten caught up in something ill and now are paying for it. "Some of them are using this time to make life better for themselves and their families," she added.

In a press release about Sister Dorothy receiving the award, Corrections Ministry coordinator Deacon Marc Kellams stated that "95% of those who are imprisoned are eventually released. If they are released with a love of the Lord in their hearts, they have a much better chance to be successful and thus not recidivate. Recognizing [Sister Dorothy's] selfless service is a mere token of our appreciation.

"Ministry in the jails and prisons could not occur without the selfless acts of so many who have dedicated their time and prayer to serve. People like Sister Dorothy faithfully visit inside the walls and serve as the face of Christ to

those who are so desperate for hope. Christ gives them that hope."

The women are not the only ones who benefit from Sister Dorothy's long term, loving presence.

> "They strengthen my faith," she said of the women. "Seeing the faith they exhibit under the circumstances. Their hope, their resilience—they inspire me."

There are other groups in whom we as Catholics are called to "hope all things." They're often those marginalized by society—the poor, immigrants, refugees, the elderly, children,

those with special needs, those suffering from an addiction.

You don't have to look far for them. Often, they exist within your own family or among your friends—a spouse seeking employment, a grandparent who wonders what they have to live for, a child struggling in school, a friend suffering from a substance abuse disorder.

Perhaps you can be the one to show someone who is struggling that you believe in them, that you see their beauty, that you trust in their potential—that you "hope all things" in them.


